### HICKTON PROVIDES CLERK OF WORKS SERVICES AT HOSPITAL



Leeds Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust has chosen South Yorkshire-based Hickton to provide Clerk of Works services on its new MRSA laboratory at Leeds General Infirmary.

Day to day activities carried out by Hickton included site meetings, technical inspection, handover and snagging, which is crucial on upgrades or refurbishments. This involved Hickton working closely with the main contractor, as well as all subcontractors on the MRSA laboratory project.

Terry Harrison continues: "A hospital is not like any other construction project in that it can never be shut down like an office block refurbishment. Keeping the building fully functional whilst work is carried out therefore requires a huge amount of co-ordination and teamwork, which is why a Clerk of Works is essential."
